Pulaski County Circuit Court Clerk Awarded Grant to Preserve Local Records

RICHMOND, Va. (TBD, 2023) – The Library of Virginia announced that the Circuit Court Records Preservation (CCRP) program has awarded Pulaski County Circuit Court Clerk, Maetta Crewe, a grant in the amount of \$57,852 for local records preservation. The funds will be used to conserve General Index to Deeds, N-Z, including Grantees A-Z; Wills 1839-1909; Marriage Licenses 1895-1897; Marriage Licenses 1898-1899, Marriage Licenses 1900-1901; Marriage Licenses 1902-1903; Marriage Licenses 1904-1905; Marriage Licenses 1906-1907; and Plat Book 1, 1892-1949, stored in her office.

"We're extremely excited," said Mrs. Crewe. "These records are the history of our county! We have an obligation to make sure they are available for future generations." Since Crewe became clerk in 2006, she has applied for numerous grants and has been awarded a total of \$261,722.00. These grant funds were used for obtaining a security camera system for the clerk's office, refurbishing and preserving 45 historical records including deed books, index books, marriage registers, reformatting and digitizing a historical criminal/murder case file, purchasing a reader printer, and reformatting six drawers of marriage licenses into six large books. In addition, she has obtained grant funds to scan all Pulaski County Deed Books and Will Books. These books are now available online for a fee through Secure Remote Access. Instead of traveling to the courthouse, lawyers, title searchers and others have the capability of accessing all of these records while in their independent offices.

Since 1990, the CCRP has awarded over 2,000 grants totaling more than \$34,000,000. This year, the program awarded \$4.7 million to 99 localities to assist the clerks' offices with their preservation efforts.

The CCRP is a collaborative program between the Library of Virginia and the Virginia Court Clerks Association (VCCA). Funded through a \$3.50 portion of the clerk's recordation fee, the CCRP provides resources to help preserve and make accessible permanent circuit court records stored in the 120 circuit courts and at the Library of Virginia. - If you have purchased, sold, or disposed of a vehicle, motorcycle, camper, trailer, motor home or mobile/manufactured home in the past year, please update your record at the DMV office as soon as possible. DMV updates are forwarded to our Personal Property Department on a regular basis allowing us to update your property record on file.
- What does January and vehicle values have in common? Personal property tax values are assessed as of January 1 every year. J.D. Power reported in January 2023 that supply chain disruptions continue but are less severe for the vehicle industry. Fewer disruptions throughout 2023 will allow some used car values to decrease. Unfortunately, a downward trend in used car values cannot be determined until January 1 of the following year. Please be patient as vehicle values continue to adjust.
- Our Real Estate Assessor will continue to make field visits throughout the year to complete necessary property appraisals. He will be in a marked vehicle and marked clothing. Any properties with value changes will receive a notice by mail.
- Please keep in mind, Commissioner of the Revenue offices across the state of Virginia are commissioned by the Constitution to implement state and local tax laws created by the General Assembly and local governments. We do not have the autonomy to change these laws as written.

There have been so many positive happenings that have occurred in our county over the past several months but first I want to address the devastating fire at the Randolph Park Pool. Around 4:30 p.m. on Friday, May 26, 2023, the Evelyn Alexander Waterpark facilities were discovered to be on fire and despite the valiant efforts of our county's crews to fight this aggressive fire, the pool house is a total loss. The loss of this facility is tragic for all of our citizens; particularly our youth. We will be working to rebuild as quickly as possible, but in reality, will probably not be able to open the waterpark this year. All other Parks and Recreation activities will continue as scheduled. We are heartbroken about this setback but it is our intention to build back better!

Our One Bag Challenge continues through the end of June with our last drawing for five \$100 gift cards to be held at the June 26, 2023, Board of Supervisors' meeting. To date, two hundred and thirty-seven (237) individuals have picked up seven hundred sixty-three (763) bags of trash, two hundred sixty-eight (268) tires and numerous pieces of furniture, building material and other large items. We received a grant to cover the cost of the tire tipping fees and prizes and on Friday, June 2, 2023, the County was awarded the Keep Virginia Beautiful grant for \$1000.00 to cover the cost of grabbers, bags and gloves. Thank You to all who have participated. You have made this a success!


The Board of Supervisors and County staff are finalizing the budget and will adopt it at our meeting on June 26, 2023. I am pleased to say the budget is balanced with no increase in taxes and supports our staff and school teachers with a 5% raise. I would like to express my sincere appreciation to my fellow board members and to our staff for all their efforts in the budget process.

The county completed a state and a privately commissioned Fire and EMS study to provide insight into where we may need to improve in providing emergency services to our citizens. We will continue to develop a plan and work with our Chiefs to determine an implementation plan over the next year to better provide next level emergency services to our community.

Our Board members continue to receive requests for pothole patching, tree trimming and mowing and we are in contact with VDOT regarding your concerns. Please remember, there are a lot of roads in the county and a great amount of maintenance to be performed, thus it may take some time to address every issue. Your patience is appreciated.
